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

Tournament Rules

Play shall be governed by the FIDE Laws of Chess.

 In the event of any dispute with the Tournament Director's decision there shall be right of appeal to a committee. No member shall assist in an appeal if he is an interested party.

3. The order of the Five (5) players submitted at the Captain's meeting shall

be the order for the whole tournament.

 Teams consisting of Four (4) players, must be submitted to the Controllers at least half an hour before play is due to commence each day.

Pairing of teams shall be the Swiss System. The first named team shall have White on the odd boards.

6. Final placings shall be decided by game points.

 In the event of ties the following methods will be used to determine placings in descending order:-

a. Match Points

b. Sonnenborn Berger

c. Sum of Opponent's Scores

d. Individual results (if only 2 teams involved)

- Rate of play for each player shall be 40 moves in 2 hours and all remaining moves in 1 hour.
- Moves must be recorded at all times except for the final five minutes of the second time control when players will be allowed to tick.
- The player whose flag falls first, loses the game unless there is insufficient mating material when the game will be declared a draw.

11. Insufficient mating material will only be the FIDE accepted cases:

King Vs. King King, Bishop Vs. King King, Knight Vs. King


